Medal presentations will be held at each venue during the day. The Closing Ceremonies and the Games banquet are set for Saturday evening in the North East Leisure

Centre.

A dance and social will follow as the Special "O" athletes celebrate their special brand of sports, fun, and fellowship.

They leave for home Sunday. The visitors are to be treated royal ly during their stay in Melfort.
