1993 KC Saskatchewan Indoor Games report

The 28th annual Knights of Columbus Saskatchewan Indoor Games were once again a major success. We had approximately 2,600 athletes participating in our meet and among these were some 20 Special Olympic athletes. Numerous Saskatchewan and KC games records were established in the open class events. Each year the athletes attending are bigger, faster and can jump higher and farther. The elementary school relays are always an exciting event to watch and this year's field of athletes provided many thrills and much excitement to the meet. Right from the opening ceremonies with Bishop James Mahoney delivering the invocation on Thursday evening to the Grand Prix program on

Saturday night, spectators were given the opportunity to witness the best track and field meet we have ever staged in the history of the games

The meet has once again attained the Mobil Grand Prix status which allows us to invite better athletes to our meet. During the Grand Prix portion of the meet two new records were established. This year we were delighted to have the first ever Russian athlete compete in our meet. Indications are that there will be more Russian athletes competing here in 1994. Also present were some Canadian stars including Jillian Richardson, Ian James and Ben Johnson. Unfortunately, Ben Johnson false started twice and was disqualified from the meet. These stars were very visible signing autographs and talking with many

elementary school athletes. Ben Johnson probably spent 40 minutes signing some 300 or more autographs. This has always been a part of the meet that we, the organizers, try to establish so that these young stars of the future can meet these world class athletes.

This year we created some new awards and dedicated events to past directors. The high school relays have now become the William A. Reid Relays and the 4x100 metre elementary school relays have been named the Nick Lucyshyn Relays. Both of these brother Knights spent many years helping to organize the meet. We also created the Ned Helfrick award. This award will be presented to the most worthy Special Olympic athlete of our meet. Brother Ned has been very active in the Special Olympic program as well as a former director of the Knights of Columbus Games.

This past year we had national television coverage by two networks — CBC and TSN. With this coverage now available we may find it easier to attract more national sponsors as well as local sponsors.

I wish to thank all councils who have contributed to our meet. As you can see by the cash and disbursements report, your support is still very much needed. I would urge each council to support our meet in some way. Any and all donations are gratefully accepted.
