Enthusiastic, energetic athletes are taking over Prime Ministers' Park this weekend.

The Saskatchewan Special Olympics Summer Games will bring more than 450 athletes from across the province to Prince Albert for fun and competition, says event chairman Phil Fredette.

"In Special Olympics the athletes just have fun. Some are very competitive, but for others it's a time for them to have fun, to reacquaint themselves with their friends. They just have a ball." said Fredette.

"The goal is to ensure the athletes have a great competition and have fun."

The top finishers at the Games will qualify for the Canadian Special Olympics Summer Games in Sudbury, Ont. next year.

The winners at nationals will, in turn, advance to the world championships in North Carolina in 1999.

"The Saskatchewan Special Olympics mandate is to provide training and competition for persons with mental disabilities," said Pat Stellek, executive director with the organization. "However, it is their abilities that qualify them on their competitive journey, along with training on a regular basis."

In Prince Albert the Games will feature bowling, swimming, athletics, softball and power lifting. The events will be held at Prime Ministers' Park; Harry Jerome Track, Carlton Comprehensive High School, Frank Dunn Pool and the Minto Bowl.
