in Kindersley. The sports designated for Special Olympic athletes are: bowling (35 & under), speed skating (29 & under) and cross country skiing (29 & under). The competitions are parallel competitions — Special Olympic, athletes, will Olympic athletes will compete at the same time and site as other athletes, but only against other Special "O" athletes. There will be integrated relays for speed skating and cross

country skiing.

The Zone 1 playoffs for bowling and speed skating will be held in conjunction with a skill development clinic at the Zone 1 Multi Sport Camp, held November 11 to 13. Th playoffs for cross count skiing will be held at

later date (depending on snow conditions). The race distances for speed skating are 400M, 800M, 1000M, 1500M and a 1500M relay. An athlete can use hockey skates if they cannot access speed skates. The cross country ski race distance is a one kilometre. tance is a one kilometre
